Suicidal Behavior in Children and Adolescents - Children's ...

In children and adolescents, risk of suicidal behavior is influenced by the presence of other mental disorders and other disorders that affect the brain, family history, psychosocial factors, and environmental factors (see table Risk Factors for Suicidal Behavior in Children and Adolescents).

Suicidal Behavior in Children and Adolescents - Pediatrics ...

For boys, the most common methods of suicide were use of firearms (26.1%), hanging (25.2%), railway suicide (20.8%), and jumping from heights (19.5%). Compared with suicides by adults, railway suicides and jump-ing from heights were significantly higher in the child and adolescent age-group.

Suicidal Behavior in Children and Adolescents ...

Suicidal behavior includes: Thinking about killing yourself. Attempting to kill yourself. Actually killing yourself (committing suicide) Children who hurt themselves in ways that clearly aren't meant to cause death, such as by scratching, cutting, or burning themselves, are considered to have nonsuicidal self-injury.

The clinical assessment of suicidal behavior of children or adolescents must consider the developmental level of the cognitive capacity of a specific child or adolescent. In general, the assessment of suicidal behavior requires a sufficient amount of time to evaluate multiple factors that are associated with suicidal behavior.

Assessing suicidal behavior in children and adolescents ...

While rare in young children, suicide is possible. Know the warning signs and risk factors that may increase your child's risk of suicide. Get your child treatment. If your child is depressed or at high risk for depression or another mental illness, it's essential to get them treatment. Keep weapons locked up. Common sense tells you to keep weapons, medications, alcohol, and poisons safely away from children, but this is especially important for children at risk of suicide.

Facts About Suicidal Thoughts in Children

Depression in Children Is a Risk for Suicidal Thoughts If your child hasn't openly expressed any suicidal thoughts, it's important to recognize the possible symptoms of childhood depression, since these are often associated with suicidal thoughts. This may include feelings such as worthlessness, hopelessness, and social withdrawal.

A history of suicidal behavior has been found in first-degree relatives of adolescent suicide victims compared with relatives of controls, even after adjusting for the differences in rates of proband and familial Axis I and II disorders. 11

Suicidal behavior includes suicidal ideation (frequent thoughts of ending one's life), suicide attempts (the actual event of trying to kill one's self), and completed suicide (death occurs). Suicidal behavior is most often accompanied by intense feelings of hopelessness, depression, or self-destructive behaviors (parasuicidal behaviors).

Emerging evidence suggests that neurobiological factors are not only critical in providing potential risk factors but also provide a promising approach to develop more effective treatment and prevention strategies. The Neurobiological Basis of Suicide discusses the most recent findings in suicide neurobiology. Psychological, psychosocial, and cultural factors are important in determining the risk factors for suicide; however, they offer weak prediction and can be of little clinical use. Interestingly, cognitive characteristics are different among depressed suicidal and depressed nonsuicidal subjects, and could be involved in the development of suicidal behavior. The characterization of the neurobiological basis of suicide is in delineating the risk factors associated with suicide. The Neurobiological Basis of Suicide focuses on how and why these neurobiological factors are crucial in the pathogenic mechanisms of suicidal behavior and how these findings can be transformed into potential therapeutic applications.
